1. SERIOUS SIDE EFFECTS

Iclusig can cause serious side effects, although not everyone taking Iclusig gets these side effects.

Blood clots or blockage in your blood vessels (arteries and veins). Blood clots or blockage in your blood vessels may lead to heart attack, stroke or death. A blood clot or blockage in your blood vessels can prevent proper blood flow to your heart, brain, bowels (intestines), legs, eyes and other parts of your body. You may need emergency surgery or treatment in a • clarithromycin, telithromycin, medicines to treat bacterial infections hospital. Seek medical attention immediately if you experience any of the following serious side effects:

- Chest pain or pressure
- Pain in your arms, legs, back, neck or jaw
- Trouble talking
- Shortness of breath
- Headache Numbness or weakness on one side of your body
- Severe stomach area pain
- Decreased vision or loss of vision

Blood clots or blockage in your blood vessels can happen in people with or without risk factors for heart and blood vessel diseases, including people 50 years of age or younger. The most common risk factors for these problems are a history of high blood pressure (hypertension) high levels of fat in the blood (hyperlipidemia), and heart disease. Blood clots or blockages in your blood vessels happens more often in people as they get older, and in people with a past history of decreased blood flow, high blood pressure, diabetes or high levels of fats in their blood.

Heart problems. Iclusig can cause heart problems, including heart failure which can be serious and may lead to death. Heart failure means your heart does not pump blood well enough. Iclusig can also cause irregular slow or fast heartbeats and • heart attack. Your doctor will check you for heart problems during your treatment with Iclusig. Seek medical attention immediately if you experience any of the following serious side effects:

- shortness of breath
- chest pain fast or irregular heartbeats
- dizziness
- feel faint

Liver problems: Iclusig can cause liver problems, including liver failure, which can be severe and may lead to death. Your doctor will do blood tests before and during your treatment with Iclusia to check for liver problems. Seek medical attention immediately if you experience any of the following serious side effects of liver problems during treatment:

- Yellowing of your skin or the white part of your eyes (jaundice)
- Dark "tea-colored"urine Sleepiness

Bleeding or bruising

- Loss of appetite
- 2. WHAT ICLUSIG IS AND WHAT IT IS USED FOR

Iclusig belongs to a group of medicines called tyrosine kinase inhibitors (TKIs). Iclusig is a prescription medicine used to treat

· chronic phase, accelerated phase, or blast phase chronic myeloid leukaemia (CML) or Philadelphia chromosome positive

- acute lymphoblatic leukemia (Ph+ALL) who cannot receive any other TKI medicines
- a specific type of abnormal gene (T315I-positive) chronic phase, accelerated phase, or blast phase CML, or T315I-postivie Ph+ALL involving too many abnormal white blood cells in the blood and the bone marrow (where blood cells are formed).

3. WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE YOU TAKE ICLUSIG

Do not take Iclusia

If you are allergic to ponatinib or any of the other ingredients of Iclusig (listed in section 6).

Iclusing should not be used for the treatment of adult patients with newly diagnosed chronic phase CML.

Warnings and precautions Before you take Iclusia, tell your doctor or pharmacist if you:

have a history of blood clots in your blood vessels (arteries or veins)

- have heart problems, including heart failure, irregular heartbeats, and OT prolongation
- have diabetes
- have a history of high cholesterol
- have liver problems have had inflammation of your pancreas (pancreatitis)

- Have high blood pressure Have bleeding problems
- Plan to have any surgical procedures
- Are lactose (milk sugar) intolerant (Iclusig tablets contain lactose)
 - Drink grapefruit juice
 - Have any other medical conditions
 - Are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. Iclusig can harm your unborn baby.

Are you breast-feeding or do you plan to breast feed Blood Tests and other health evaluations

Your doctor will perform:

- Evaluations of your heart function and the condition of your arteries and veins A complete blood count
- This will be repeated every 2 weeks for the first 3 months after starting the therapy. Afterwards it is performed monthly or
- Checks of the serum protein known as lipase
- A serum protein called lipase will be checked every 2 weeks for the first 2 months, then as indicated by your doctor. A break in treatment or a decrease in dose may be required when lipase is increased

Liver function tests will be performed at least monthly or as indicated by your doctor.

Children and adolescents

Do not give this medicine to children under 18 years because no data are available in children.

Taking Iclusig with other medicines, herbal or dietary supplements

Please tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are taking, have recently taken or might take any other medicines, including medicines obtained without a prescription. The following medicines can affect or be affected by Iclusig:

- ketoconazole, itraconazole, voriconazole, posaconazole: medicines to treat fungal infections
- indinavir, nelfinavir, ritonavir, saguinavir; medicine to treat HIV infections.
- **nefazodone**: a medicine to treat depression.
- St. John's wort: a herbal product used to treat depression
- carbamazepine: a medicine to treat epilepsy, euphoric/depressive stages and certain pain conditions
- phenytoin: medicines to treat epilepsy
- rifampicin: medicines to treat tuberculosis or certain other infections • boceprevir, telaprevir: medicines to treat hepatitis C
- conivaptan: a medicine to treat low sodium levels

Iclusig with food and drink

While taking Iclusig, avoid grapefruit products such as grapefruit juice.

Iclusig may be taken with or without foods.

Pregnancy and breast-feeding

If you are pregnant, or are planning to become pregnant, tell your doctor before you take Iclusig.

Verify the pregnancy status of females of reproductive potential prior to initiating iclusing treatment. For females who can become pregnant:

- Use an effective form of birth control during treatment and for 3 weeks after your last dose of Iclusig. Tell your doctor or pharmacist right away if you become pregnant or think you might be pregnant during treatment with
- Iclusig may affect your ability to have children. Tell your doctor if this is a concern for you.

- It is not known if Iclusig passes into your breast milk. Do not breastfeed during treatment and for 6 days after your last dose of Iclusig
- Men receiving treatment with Iclusig are advised not to father a child during treatment. Effective contraception must be
- used during treatment. Ask your doctor or pharmacist for advice before taking any medicine.

Driving and using machines

You should take special care when driving and using machines as patients taking Iclusig may experience visual disturbance, dizziness, sleepiness, and tiredness.

Important information about some of the ingredients of Iclusig

Iclusia contains lactose. If you have been told by your doctor or pharmacist that you have an intolerance to milk sugar (lactose) contact your doctor or pharmacist before taking this medicine.

4. HOW TO TAKE ICLUSIG

Always take Iclusig exactly as your doctor or pharmacist has told you. You should check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure.

The usual dose is

A 45 mg film-coated tablet for the recommended dose.

A 15 mg film-coated tablet to allow for dose adjustments

The recommended starting dose is one 45 mg film-coated tablet once daily. Your doctor may reduce your dose or tell you to temporarily stop taking Iclusig if:

- An appropriate response to the treatment is reached • The number of white blood cells called neutrophils is reduced
- The number of blood platelets is reduced
- A severe side effect occurs, not affecting the blood Pancreas inflammation
- o Increased levels of the serum protein lipase You develop heart or blood vessel problems
- You have a liver disorder

Iclusig use may be resumed at the same, or a reduced dose, after the event is resolved or controlled. Your doctor may evaluate your response to the treatment at regular intervals.

Instructions for proper use:

Swallow the tablets whole. The tablets can be taken with or without food. Do not crush or dissolve the tablets. Do not swallow the desiccant canister contained in the bottle.

Frequency of administration:

Make sure you take Iclusiq daily for as long as it is prescribed. This is a long-term treatment.

If you take more Iclusig than you should

Talk to your doctor immediately if this occurs.

If you forget to take Iclusig

Do not take a double dose to make up for a forgotten dose. Take your next dose at your regular time.

If you stop taking Iclusing

Do not stop taking Iclusig without your doctor

If you have any further questions on the use of this product, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

5. POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS Like all medicines, this medicine can cause side effects, although not everybody gets them.

Serious side effects (very common: affects more than 1 to 10 users):

doctor if you get any of these symptoms during treatment with Iclusia:

- Blood clots or blockage in your blood vessels (arteries and veins). A blood clot or blockage in your blood vessels can prevent proper blood flow to your heart, brain or other parts of your body and may lead to tissue death, heart attack,
- High blood pressure. Your blood pressure should be checked regularly and any high blood pressure should be treated while you are taking Iclusia. Tell your doctor if you get confusion, headaches, dizziness, chest pain or shortness of breath. Neuropathy. Iclusiq may cause damage to the nerves in your arms, brain, hands, legs, or feet (neuropathy). Tell your
- Muscle weakness, tingling, burning, pain and loss of feeling in your hands and feet
- Double vision and other problems with eyesight, trouble moving the eye, drooping of part of the face, sagging or drooping evelids, change in taste
- Effects on the eye. Serious eye problems that can lead to blindness or blurred vision may happen with Iclusiq. Tell your doctor if you get any of the following symptoms: bleeding in the eye, perceived flashes of light, light sensitivity, floaters, dry inflamed, swollen or itchy eyes and eye pain. Your doctor will monitor your vision before and during your treatment
- Low blood cell counts. Iclusig may cause low blood cell counts. Your doctor will check your blood counts regularly during

 Increased blood levels of several liver enzymes called: treatment with Iclusiq. Tell your doctor right away if you have a fever or any signs of an infection while taking Iclusiq. Decreased number of red blood cells (symptoms include; weakness, dizziness, fatique)
- Decreased number of blood platelets (symptoms include: increased tendency to bleed or bruise) Decreased number of white blood cells called neutrophils (symptoms include: increase tendency for infection).
- Bleeding. Iclusia can cause bleeding which can be serious and may lead to death. Tell your doctor if you get any signs of bleeding during treatment with Iclusig including:
- Vomiting blood or if your vomit looks like coffee grounds
- Pink or brown urine
- Red or black (looks like tar) stools
- Coughing up blood or blood clots
- Unusual bleeding or bruising of your skin Menstrual bleeding that is heavier than normal
- Unusual vaginal bleeding

o Confusion

- Nose bleeds that happen often Drowsiness or difficulty being awakened
- Headache
- Change in speech Liver problems. Iclusig can cause liver problems, including liver failure. Get medical help right away if you get any of these
- Yellowing of your skin or the white part of your eyes (Jaundice)
- Dark "tea-colored" urine

Bleeding or bruising

- Sleepiness
- Loss of appetite

Serious side effects (common: affects 1 to 10 users in 100):

- Inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis). Symptoms include sudden stomach-area pain, nausea, and vomiting. Your doctor should do blood tests to check for pancreatitis during treatment with Iclusia.
- Fever, often with other signs of infection due to decreased number of white blood cells Fluid retention. Your body may hold too much fluid (fluid retention). Tell your doctor right away if you get any of these
- symptoms during treatment with Iclusia: Swelling of your hands, ankles, feet, face, or all over your body
- Weight gain
- Shortness of breath and cough

Your doctor may do blood tests to check for TLS

Heart problems and irregular heartbeat. Iclusig can cause heart problems, including heart failure. Iclusig may also cause an irregular heartbeats and heart attack. Tell your doctor right away if you experience loss of consciousness, faintness, dizziness, chest pain, palpitations

Serious side effects (Not known: frequency cannot be estimated from the available data) • Tumor Lysis Syndrome (TLS). TLS is caused by a fast breakdown of cancer cells. TLS can cause you to have:

- Kidney failure and the need for dialysis treatment An abnormal heartbeat
- Posterior reversible encephalopathy syndrome (PRES). Iclusig may trigger a condition called PRES. Call your doctor right away if you get headaches, seizures, confusion, changes in vision, problems thinking. Possible wound healing problems. If you need to have a surgical procedure, tell your doctor that you are taking Iclusig.
- You should stop taking Iclusig at least 1 week before any planned surgery. A tear in your stomach or intestinal wall (perforation). Tell your doctor right away if you get:

- Severe pain in your stomach-area (abdomen)
- Swelling of the abdomen
- High fever

Other possible side effects that may occur with the following frequencies are:

- Arterial ischemia
- Abdominal pain
- Constipation Nausea
- Diarrhea
- Vomiting Sores in the mouth and mouth pain
- Urinary tract infection
- Upper airway infection
- Headache Dizziness
- Cough Breathing difficulties
- Rash and related conditions Drv skin
- Itchy skin
- Joint pain Muscle pain
- Muscle spasms Pain in arms or legs
- Back pain Bone pain

Cardiac failure

If any of the side effects gets serious, or if you notice any side effects not listed in this leaflet, please tell your doctor or pharmacist.

6. HOW TO STORE ICLUSIG

Keep Iclusig out of the reach and sight of children. Do not store Iclusig above 30°C. Store in the original container.

The bottle contains one sealed plastic canister containing a desiccant canister. Keep the canister in the bottle. Do not swallow the desiccant caniste

Do not use Iclusig after the expiry date which is stated on the carton after EXP. The expiry date refers to the last day of that Medicines should not be disposed of via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to dispose of medicines no

7. CONTENTS OF THE PACK AND OTHER INFORMATION

What Iclusig contains The active substance is ponatinib.

Each 15 mg film-coated tablet contains 15 mg ponatinib (as ponatinib hydrochloride) Each 45 mg film-coated tablet contains 45 mg ponatinib (as ponatinib hydrochloride).

The other ingredients are lactose monohydrate, microcrystalline cellulose, sodium starch glycolate (type B). colloidal silicon dioxide and magnesium stearate. The tablet coating consists of talc, polyethylene glycol, polyvinyl alcohol and titanium dioxide.

What Iclusig looks like and contents of the pack

Iclusing film-coated tablets are white and round. Iclusing 15 mg film-coated tablets are approximately 6 mm in diameter with "A5" on one side, and plain on the

Iclusing 45 mg film-coated tablets are approximately 9 mm in diameter with "AP4" on one side and plain on

Iclusing is available in plastic bottles, each containing one desiccant canister and induction sealed child resistant closure. Bottles are packed within a cardboard box.

Manufacturer and batch release site:

Bottles of Iclusig 15 mg contain 30 film-coated tablets.

Bottles of Iclusia 45 mg contain 30 film-coated tablets.
